#### Context for the review



#### **Government priorities:**

- Deregulate and streamline wherever possible
- Regulate only when essential after all other approaches rejected
- Policies to support desire to be Greenest Government ever
- Further improve compliance

#### How regulation is controlled:

- A one-in, one-out approach to regulation
- A Spending Review commitment to reduce the regulatory burden on housebuilders by April 2015
- Greater scrutiny of analysis and policy by RPC and RRC
- A moratorium on regulation that affects micro-businesses and start-ups until April 2014
- And the Red Tape Challenge too…

#### Context for the review



- Minister Andrew Stunell launched a call for ideas from external partners in July 2010
- Over 200 responses (and 600+ on Changing Places toilets), but not a lot of unexpected issues or suggestions
- Also drew upon the views submitted to the Cabinet Office's Your Freedom and DCLG's Cut Red Tape websites
- Generally supportive of the regime setting national minimum standards, particularly in relation to health and safety
- Some areas where improvement was necessary and some concern about the increasing complexity around the energy efficiency provisions
- Ministerial statement on 16 December 2010 setting out areas for further consideration

## Communities and Local Government

#### The consultation - overview

- The consultation package was launched on 31 January 2012
- The consultation is made up of four sections:
  - 1 An introduction and overview of the package, plus various technical amendments relating to Parts A, B, C, K, M, N and Regulations 7
  - 2 Changes to the energy efficiency provisions in Part L
  - 3 Changes to provisions on electrical safety in the home
  - 4 Changes to the building control system
- The package is supported by nine Impact Assessments
- Also supported by an easier to read summary of the consultation proposals

#### The consultation - overview



- A significant deregulatory package a net out of £63.1m per year
- However, these outs do not fall uniformly across industry
- Part L proposals for new homes represent an <u>additional cost on</u> <u>housebuilders</u> of £103m per year
- Recognise the challenge this represents DCLG are committed to finding compensating outs or changing the package accordingly

#### **Timing of changes**



We are proposing that changes come into force on:

- Domestic consequential improvements (extensions) October 2012
- Deregulatory changes April 2013
- Regulatory changes October 2013 (with aim of having published 6 months before this)
- Remaining domestic and non-domestic consequential improvements – April 2014

Also signalled that we would consider timings and transitional arrangements as part of the consultation eg to minimise the impacts on small businesses

# Proposals in Section One of the Consultation



### The consultation proposals Section one

Section one provides an introduction to, and overview of, the consultation package as a whole and a number of changes

It includes a number of <u>deregulatory and simplification</u> proposals:

- Rationalisation of Approved Documents K, M and N to remove areas of conflict and confusion ie moving guidance on stairs, ramps & manifestation from ADM into new Approved Document K (there will no longer be a Part N)
- Technical amendments to Approved Document B on wall linings and light diffusers (the latter a significant financial out)
- Amending guidance on Access Statements to promote their use where they add value rather than as a matter of course



#### **Deregulatory and simplification proposals**

Section one

#### A new Approved Document K

- Merging guidance on Parts K, M and N
- Moving the detailed guidance on stairs, ramps & manifestation from Approved Document M into new Approved Document K
- No more Approved Document N
- New style for approved documents more user friendly layout and language








Section one

#### Part B (Fire safety)

- Proposals for new guidance on lighting diffusers
- Deregulatory, a significant 'out'
- Considering new guidance on decorative wall coverings, subject to research findings
- Intention to remove a number of fire safety provisions from Local Acts







### **Deregulatory and Simplification proposals**

Section one

#### Part M (Access to and use for buildings)

- **Access Statements** 
  - Proposals to modify Approved Document guidance to shift from reliance on written Access Statements to a more risk based approach
- Clarification of relationship of Approved Document M & the Equality Act 2010 including application of 10 year exemption for service providers
- Roundtable of construction professions to discuss how designers can be supported in delivering inclusive design



### The consultation proposals Section one

#### **Regulatory proposals:**

- Updating Approved Document A (Structure) so as to reference the new British Standards based on Eurocodes
- Updating Approved Document C (Site preparation and resistance to moisture) so as to reference the most up-todate radon maps and ensure radon protection measures are properly targeted

#### Non-regulatory approaches proposed:

- Domestic security we have decided to work with Home Office and industry to try and promote voluntary adoption of suitable minimum standards
- Changing Places toilets looking to facilitate external partners coming together to realise opportunities to increase provision voluntarily in the first instance



### Regulatory proposals Section one

#### Part A (Structure)

- Proposals to amend Approved Document A
  - Replace current references to withdrawn British Standards for structural design with reference to Eurocodes
  - Possible additional guidance on role of 'other' structural standards
  - Changes to guidance linked to Eurocodes implementation including recalibration of Diagrams 6 & 7 (limiting building heights) and A3 (Disproportionate collapse) robustness guidance
  - Amendment of Table 5 on wall ties standards and spacing
- Discussions on clarification of guidance related to foundation depths and to recovering roofs


### Part C (Site preparation & resistance to contamination and moisture) consultation

- Proposals to amend guidance to align it with the 2007 radon maps published by the Health Protection Agency (and guidance in BRE publication BR211)
  - 2007 maps show a wider spread of areas with higher radon risk than 1999 maps
  - July 2008 Circular Letter encouraged use of 2007 maps as best practice outlined intention to regulate
  - Proposals require new maps or site-specific risk assessment to be used
- Considering removal of Approved Document C Annex on contaminated land if not helpful guidance




Current guidance in AD C refers to 1999 Health Protection Agency maps



### The consultation proposals Section one

### Approved Document supporting Regulation 7 (Material and Workmanship)

#### Cross-cutting proposal

 Amend the Approved Document supporting Regulation 7 to clarify that Declarations of Performance and CE marking will become the main source of information on the performance characteristics of construction products from July 2013



### Non-regulatory approaches proposals Section one

#### Consultation discussion on domestic security

- Promote voluntary industry adoption of suitable minimum standards
- Work with key partners including industry and Home Office to assist consumers in making more informed choices at the point of purchase
- Explore further a targeted approach in areas of higher rates of burglary



### Non-regulatory approaches proposals

Section one

#### Consultation discussion on Changing Places Toilets

- Toilet facilities for adults with multiple or profound disabilities
- Changing Places Campaign has been successful where
  - conditions are favourable in increasing provision of these changing facilities
  - corporate awareness and 'buy in' identified as factors for success
- Current indications are that industry is willing to develop further this voluntary approach
- Facilitate external partners coming together to realise opportunities to increase provision voluntarily in the first instance



### The consultation proposals Section one

#### Proposals not brought forward to consultation:

- Revoking Part D (Toxic substances) not being considered further as evidence suggests urea formaldehyde still used
- Reviewing Part H6 (Solid waste storage) not being taken further pending work on the Waste Review and with local authorities on waste collection approaches
- Reviewing Part E4 (Acoustics in schools) DfE will be consulting on changes to their guidance on this issue later this year
