Part P (Electrical Safety - Dwellings)

Introduced in 2005 to

- improve the competence of domestic electrical installers
- improve the quality of electrical installation work in dwellings
- reduce the number of accidents (electric shocks & electrical fires in homes)



The consultation proposals Section three

How it works and its effect

- Major ('notifiable') electrical jobs in the home must be overseen by a building control body or carried out by an electrician registered with a Part P Competent Person Scheme
- The number of registered electricians has increased from 11,000 in 2005 to nearly 40,000 now
- Registered electricians now carry out nearly all notifiable jobs



The consultation proposals Section three

- We are proposing changes to Approved Document P to reduce the regulatory burden on business and consumers
 - by extending the range of simpler, 'non-notifiable' jobs that do not need to be inspected by the local authority - for example kitchens and gardens
 - by allowing DIYers and unregistered installers to employ a qualified electrician to inspect and test notifiable work as an alternative to using to the local authority
- Amounts to a deregulatory 'out' of £9.7m per year
- We are also proposing to update Approved Document P reference to current version of BS 7671

Section four

Key drivers for changes to the Building Control System are:

- Reduce burdens
- Improve compliance
- Encourage industry to take greater responsibility for their actions
- Level the playing field between building control bodies



The consultation proposals Section four

Proposals for improving Local Authority (LA) processes

•Make issue of completion certificates mandatory and within specified time period where building work is completed & considered compliant

•Amend wording on LA completion certificates & equivalents

•Reduce number of statutory notifications & introduce requirement for "service plans" based on risk assessment



Proposals for improving Approved Inspector (AI) arrangements

•Amend AI Regulations to reduce burdens on both AIs and LAs

•Remove Warranty Link Rule

Strengthening enforcement

- Align & extend time limits for s35 & 36 of the Building Act and increase fine limit
- Introduce new civil enforcement sanctions under Regulatory & Enforcement Sanctions Act 2008:
 - Stop Notices
 - Compliance & Restoration Notices
 - Penalties (fixed & variable)
 - Enforcement undertakings
 - What sanctions for what breaches? What level of penalties?



The consultation proposals Section four

Alternatives to supervision by Building Control

- Extend competent person self-certification schemes framework
- Introduce specialist third party certification schemes
 - What type of work? Eg structure?
- Introduce option for developers to use Appointed Persons (APs) on voluntary basis - complementary to supervision by building control?
 - What qualifications/experience & roles/responsibilities should these have? On- site co-ordination?
