

Strong industry relations with the Government


Focus on homebuilding remains a key priority for economic growth



A challenging outlook

- Housing delivery fell by 6% year-on-year
- Data on EPCs and planning approvals suggest further falls in supply to come
- 2024 saw the lowest number of new homes approved in a decade
- Economic challenges persist, with limited growth and risk of rising inflation







Industry specific challenges: Planning

- Planning has been the number one barrier for many years
 - 2 Under resourcing of planning departments = delays and blocks
- 300 new planners have been promised

 HBF estimates 2,200 are needed
 - Improving the planning system is only one part of the solution

Section 106 Affordable Housing

- 17,000 Affordable Homes remain uncontracted
- The private sector delivers almost half of all Affordable Homes many of which are at risk
- A perfect storm of pressures for RPs

What's needed?

- A Written Ministerial Statement to encourage cascade mechanisms
- Longer term, the financial capacity of housing associations must be rebuilt














Building safety

- Industry has committed £6 billion through the Residential Property Developer Tax (RPDT) and the Building Safety Pledge
- No such commitment has been made by any other industry
- SMEs will be particularly affected by the Building Safety Levy
- A welcome delay to autumn 2026 but disappointing that government is still pushing ahead

Demand side support


- Incredibly challenging climate for first-time buyers
- Average FTB in England must save half of their earnings for almost a decade to afford a deposit
- Help to Buy was rewarding for the taxpayer:

On track to deliver Assisted over a third of returns of £2bn a million households

• Spending review – an opportunity to introduce a demand side support scheme
